

WHY FORM A COALITION?

To Address:

- Known Water Quality Issues
- agriculture and other non-point sources of pollution
- on-site septic systems and community wastewater discharges
- acidic atmospheric deposition
- urban runoff, industrial wastes, municipal wastewater, and combined sewer overflow
- protection of priority drinking water supplies

TO IDENTIFY GAPS IN INFORMATION & COMPILE A USABLE DATABASE OF BASIN FEATURES

What was:

- 35% of all stream/river miles in-Basin were without assessment
- 36% of all pond/lake/reservoir acres in-Basin were without assessment
- Relevant natural and built features of the Basin had not been catalogued
- The function of government entities had not been evaluated in relation to water quality

WHY DID WE WRITE A MANAGEMENT PLAN?

- 1. To create an effective framework for future environmental work within the Mohawk Valley
- 2. The plan will function as a spring-board for implementation and program growth within the Basin, appealing to local, state, and federal interests
- 3. Members of the Coalition and others will use management strategies identified in the plan for the development of conservation initiatives within the region.




Determine action based on weighted score

Scoring matrix is plan specific




ONLINE MAPPER

Funded through Title 11 EPF approved for funding in 2014


Total cost \$967,250
